The shrine welcomed the annual visit of the Hawaii Peace Mission - - a Japanese organization of interfaith leaders that participates in the annual Pearl Harbor ceremony.

83 years ago, Japan launched an attack on the U.S. Naval base of Pearl Harbor killing more than 2,400 service members and accelerating U.S. involvement in World War II.

Every year, thousands gather at Pearl Harbor to remember the events of December 7, 1941 to reflect on the "Day of Infamy" and to honor the members of the Greatest Generation for their sacrifice and courage.

The Hawaii Peace Mission was formed in 1983 by religious leaders in Japan to make the annual pilgrimage to Hawaii to participate in the U.S. Navy and National Park Service's Remembrance ceremony.

MAHALO NUI LOA for your most generous donations to the shrine in 2024. You can deduct contributions to Nonprofit churches only if you itemize on Schedule A of Form 1040. The shrine is a qualified Nonprofit church.

Generally, you can deduct monetary contributions or property you make to a qualified organization.

VOLUNTEERS - You can deduct as a charitable contribution, any unreimbursed out-of-pocket expenses, such as the cost of gas and oil, related to the use of your car in giving services to a church. You can also deduct parking fees. You must keep written records of your car expenses.

Since January 1, 2018, the standard mileage rate for the use of a car or van, pickup or panel truck is 14 cents per mile driving in service of any charitable organization. The rate is scheduled to be increased in 2025.

OSECHI RYORI

The holiday season is a time of family rituals and traditions.

Families gather for meals, religious observances, gift sharing and other special events that are eagerly anticipated all year around.

Rituals and traditions strengthen families and can give family members a sense of roots and history that lasts for generations.

To the Japanese, the first day of the new year is the most important and auspicious day of the year.

Since it symbolizes the start of a new year, the day should be full of joy and void of any stress, conflict or anger. In times past, no work was to be done by anyone - this includes cleaning, washing dishes and other household tasks.

So, in order for wives to enjoy the festivities, *osechi ryori* or special New Years cuisine was developed.

Most items are prepared in such a way that they can be stored without refrigeration for up to 5 days.

While each household used to prepare its own *osechi ryori*, nowadays many restaurants and supermarkets offer a wide variety of *osechi ryori* to make it a truly work-free New Year.

Kuromame (Black beans) is eaten for health and to work diligently

Konbu maki or **Kobu maki** is said to be an auspicious dish because it sounds like *yorokobu* or happiness

Nishime or **umani** is eaten for harmony within the household

The *daikon* in **Namasu** signifies a pure and unblemished life

Kazunoko or seasoned herring roe signifies fertility

Kuri Kinton (mashed sweet potato with chestnuts) signifies fortune and wealth

Offerings such as *mochi* were offered to the *Toshigami* or the *kami* of the New Year on the eve. The *mochi* was then used in the traditional *Ozoni mochi* soup

MAINTENANCE



In late November the two *suzu* bells were cleaned, polished and new skirts attached to them in preparation of the new year.

The bells were once again attached and anchored to the eaves of the roofs on 12/4/2024.

The annual application of a highly textured, high performance non-skid paint was done on 12/2.

The old paint was stripped and the stairs pressure washed prior to application.

This polymer acrylic blend ensures a safe, slip resistant surface even in wet conditions - helping to meet and exceed safety standards for staircases.

MAINTENANCE

On the morning of 11/27, a truck with a rolloff entered the shrine's parking lot, scraping the underside of the metal gate. A vertical metal support bar popped off as a result of the impact.

The metal gate looks like a *torii* gate with the name of the shrine at the top and sits at the entrance of the parking lot.

The extent of the damage is not known until a qualified welder conducts a structural inspection of the gate to ascertain the extent of the damages.

The truck was attempting to deliver the rolloff to an address on Olomea, a few doors down from the shrine. Instead, it entered the shrine parking lot, despite the street number "1239" posted on the gate.

HPD was called so that a police report could be filed.

At first, the officer was reluctant to file a report, stating all sorts of reasons why incidents such as this should be settled among the property owner and perpetrator without intervention by the police or insurance companies.

Upon insistence, a police report was finally filed under "traffic incident."
