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The shrine's Stars and Stripes omamori was featured in a book entitled "*Omamori no Hon*" or literally, the Omamori Book that was published on 1/25/2018 in Japan.

Omamori are amulets, charms or talismans that contain divine power and provide specific forms of protection or luck. Omamori are offered at any shrine or temple.

The book is a compilation of rare, unusual and unique *omamori* available at shrines around the world.

Repairs and replacement of the old, damaged and corroded water-supply valve was done on Saturday, 2/10 by Magaling Kubetero Plumbing.

Board of Water Supply (BWS) personnel was called to shut off the City & County's curb box for the duration of the replacement.

Both the curb box and the main shut off valve are in a covered box within a pit underground and requires a special key or implement to gain access into the chamber.

No bugs or critters were in the curb box or the shrine's main valve box however, mud and debris filled the chamber, requiring BWS personnel and our plumbers to dig out about 7 inches of dirt from the chamber.

Concrete was removed around the shrine's valve chamber to expose the handles and box. The project took 6 hours.
